

In Memoriam: Paul J Anderson MD

Former CBE president Paul J Anderson died 11 August at his home in Manhattan. The cause was a brain tumor diagnosed in early July. Anderson was 72.

A CBE member since 1966, Anderson served as president in 1984-1985. He also chaired various CBE committees, including the committee that produced the book *Illustrating Science: Standards for Publication*. Barbara Meyers, immediate past president of CBE, has characterized Anderson as “one of our great leaders and special colleagues”.

Anderson, a prominent neuropathologist, was editor-in-chief of the *Journal of Histochemistry and Cytochemistry* from 1973 to 1996. In addition, he served for 20 years as editor of the *Journal of Neuropathology*

and *Experimental Neurology*. He was author or coauthor of more than 100 scientific articles and 4 books.

At the time of his death, Anderson was a clinical professor of neurology and pathology at Mount Sinai Hospital and an attending neurologist at Beth Israel Hospital. Earlier, he had for 30 years headed the Division of Neuropathology at the Mount Sinai Hospital and School of Medicine. Over the years, he had received multiple recognitions

for excellence in teaching.

Anderson's interests included music, literature, poetry, archeology, fine arts, gardening, and culinary arts. Instructions for Chili Pablo, “the landmark Paul J Anderson recipe”, graced the back of the program for his memorial service, held 17 September in New York.
